BY-LAWS

Article I. Title

The Association shall be known as the 196th Light Infantry Brigade Association.

Article II. Aims and Objectives

Section 1. To preserve and foster the spirit of fellowship among former and possible future members of the 196th Light Infantry Brigade, U.S. Army, and provide an organization through which they may unite in bonds of comradeship.

Section 2. To commemorate the memory of soldiers who gave their lives in the service of their country.

Section 3. To support a national military that will promote stability and peace throughout the world.

Section 4. To foster public understanding and support of the United States Army.

Section 5. To promote and perpetuate those Army and unit traditions that contribute to esprit de corps and superior performance of duty.

Article III. Membership

Section 1. Membership in the 196th Light Infantry Brigade Association shall be open to any soldier, active, retired or honorably discharged Veteran, who served or was attached to the 196th Light Infantry Brigade during its active service.

Section 2. Terms of Membership. Membership in the Association shall remain in force so long as the member maintains current status by payment of prescribed dues.

Article IV. Officers

Section 1. Enumeration. The Officers of the Association shall be a President who shall be the Chief Executive Officer, a Vice President, a Secretary and a Treasurer.

Section 2. Duties. The Officers of the Association shall administer the affairs of the Association in accordance with the By-Laws.

Section 3. Terms and Election. The President and the Vice President shall be elected by the membership, as provided in these By-Laws. The terms of office of the President and Vice President shall be two (2) years, and they shall be eligible for reelection. The other officers shall be appointed by the President.

Section 4. Vacancies in Elective Offices. If the President vacates his office during his term, the Vice President shall succeed thereto.

STUDENT PROJECT CONNECTS SON WITH HIS FATHER'S FAMILY -196TH WEBSITE MADE IT HAPPEN-

The following article from the Rapid City Journal, 10 April 05, was sent to the Association by Larry Mayes, Colonel, USAF (Retired). Larry was a lifelong friend of Bob "Chomp" Lewis, the father in this story.

STUDENT PROJECT HELPS MAN FIND FATHER'S FAMILY

PIERRE (AP) - A project completed by a South Dakota seventh-grader has helped link a California man with the father he never knew.

In the mid-1960s, when Robert Harris' mother became pregnant and was unwed, her family sent her out to South Dakota to have her baby.

Harris, now of Sunnyvale, CA, said he knew his father's name, Robert Russell Lewis, and that he had died January 10, 1968, but didn't know much more about him. As he started looking for information, he found his father's name on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial and discovered he had served with the 196th Light Infantry Brigade.

With that information, he went on-line and found that the 196th Association had a web site and a forum for discussions.

He posted a message on February 20, 2004 asking if anyone had information on his father.

"I soon received replies from some who had served with my father, though none knew him well," Harris said.

He was also directed to the book "Through the Valley, Vietnam 1967-1968," which included a description of injuries his father had received.

"Between the book and the other communications, I got a pretty good idea of the conditions under which my father served, but little about the nature of the man himself," Harris said.

Enter Shirley Swanson's seventh-grade reading class at Stanley County Middle School. In February 2005, she gave her students an assignment to research fallen heroes. Student Christa Wolf was to do a report on a Pierre, SD Army lieutenant, Robert Russell Lewis.

With her teacher's help, Christa tracked down Lewis' sisters, Ruth Cassel and Linda Guernsey of Broken Bow, Nebraska. Christa also found that Lewis had grown up in Pierre, was the son of Russell and Ellen Lewis, had entered the U.S. Army in 1967 and was sent to Vietnam the same year.

While on an infantry patrol in January 1968, Lewis was wounded by grenade fragments and died of complications from those wounds five days later. But in further research, teacher Swanson found Harris' post-

ing on the 196th guestbook message board.

It read:

"I am looking for anyone who served with 1st Lt. Robert Russell Lewis of the 196th. He was born and raised in Pierre, South Dakota, and killed in action Jan 10, 1968. I am his son, and know little of his life and nothing of his service or death. Thank you."

Teacher Swanson and her student Christa were unaware that Lewis had a son.

"I thought it was a little strange that we had found this man that was Lewis' son, and his sisters hadn't said anything about him," Christa said.

Swanson then had to decide whether to give the information to Lewis' remaining family. Eventually, she phoned Lewis' sisters to tell them about the 196th web site posting.

Ruth Cassel, Lewis's sister said, "Needless to say, Linda and I were a little shocked and almost in denial. We questioned his true identity. 'What did he want?' was the next question."

A few days later, Cassel and her sister Linda e-mailed Harris.

"I was surprised and delighted to find mail from my aunts in my in-box. They have been welcoming, curious and kind," Harris said.

Since the discovery, Harris has become acquainted with his aunts through phone calls and more e-mail. They hope to meet in person at some point.

"We are thrilled to know there is a living link to our brother," Cassel said. "We are truly excited about finding a new nephew, and although we do not have a time set, we plan to see each other in the future."

COL Tom Guthrie graduated from Bucknell University in 1985 and following the Infantry Officers Basic Course, assumed duties as Platoon Leader and Company XO in the 2nd Infantry Division, Korea. In 1987, he was then assigned to Bravo Company, 2nd Ranger Battalion, Ft Lewis, WA and again served as a Platoon Leader and Company XO.

After the Infantry Officer's Advanced Course in 1990, he served as Commander, A Co, 4th Ranger Training Battalion, Ft Benning, Georgia before rejoining the Ranger Regiment in 1991. During this tour, LTC Guthrie served as a Regimental Plans/Exercises Officer, then Battalion Assistant S3 and Charlie Company Commander in the 1st Ranger Battalion, Hunter Army Airfield, Georgia.

Upon completion of the Command and General Staff College in 1996, he served as a Battalion S3, the Division's Chief of Operations and Brigade S3 in the 10th Mountain Division, Ft Drum, NY. He then served at PERSCOM from 1999-2001 as the Infantry Branch assignment officer for Majors and was the Chief of Assignments for Combat Arms Division.

He commanded 2-27 IN at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii, 2001-2003 and then served as one of the Infantry Task Force Senior Observer/Controllers at Ft Polk, LA, 2003-2004. COL Guthrie attended the Naval War College, 2004-2005 and before assuming brigade command served as the TRADOC LNO to the United States Marine Corps at Quantico, VA from 2005-2006.

COL Guthrie possesses all the normal awards, decorations and badges common to a career infantry officer.






LOCAL ATTRACTIONS



Reunion Info Sheet

Northern Kentucky calls itself “The Southern Side of Cincinnati.” We are going to soak up some of that Southern Hospitality during our 2007 Reunion. There’s something for everyone in the Northern KY/Cincinnati area.

The Transit Authority of Northern KY (TANK) provides bus service Monday thru Friday from the doorstep of the Drawbridge Inn to the Transit Center in Covington, KY where you can transfer to the “Southbank Shuttle” which will take you to most of the attractions in Northern KY and some in Cincinnati. The “Southbank Shuttle” runs on the weekends. Schedules and maps will be provided in your registration packets.

The NKY attractions are –

The Newport Aquarium – A 100,000 sq foot aquarium with acrylic tubes that you can stroll thru and come face to face with some of the most exotic sea life in the world, a terrific penguin exhibit and a tidal pool area where you can actually pet a shark!

Newport on the Levee – An exciting riverfront Town Square with more than 10 restaurants, unique shops, art gallery, Comedy Club, 20 screen AMC Cinema and Gameworks Video World. It is adjacent to the Aquarium. Or you could walk across the Ohio River on the “Purple People Bridge”.

Hofbrauhaus – Newport – Restaurant and Bier Hall – It’s Wunderbar!! The first authentic Hofbrauhaus in America modeled after the original in Munich, Germany. It offers the beer, the food and the German fun known as “Gemutlichkeit” that is famous the world over. The beer is brewed on site. The food is authentic German meats prepared by local German butchers and the breads and Bavarian Pretzels are baked fresh daily by local German bakers,

Mainstrasse Village – The home of Old World charm and new world fun. It is part of Covington’s German heritage and contains over 60 unique shops, restaurants, bars and businesses in a historic setting. See the clock tower and the Goose Girl Fountain in this richly historic area.

On the Cincinnati side –

The Great American Ballpark & Cincinnati Reds Hall of Fame & Museum – If you are a baseball fan, you can’t miss this!

The National Underground Railroad Freedom Center – You will find, as you tour the exhibits, that the Freedom Center is much more than a museum and cultural center. The Freedom Center reveals stories about freedom’s heroes, from the era of the Underground Railroad to contemporary times, challenging and inspiring everyone to take courageous steps for freedom today. There is much to see and hear. Allow at least 3 hours to maximize your experience.

These attractions are not accessible using TANK or the Southside Shuttle but are well worth considering –

Cincinnati Museum Center at Union Terminal – Opened in 1933, Union Terminal covers 500,000 square feet and is one of the country’s most spectacular examples of Art Deco. It has been restored to its original grandeur and now houses 3 fine museums and an IMAX theater. The museums are the Cincinnati History Museum, Cinergy Children’s Museum and the Museum of Natural History and Science.

Of course there is also Paramount Kings Island and Coney Island Park for family fun.

There’s also a Premier Antique Mall in Florence, KY. Just a few minutes south on I-75 from the hotel.

*******TOUR*******



196th Bde spreads Christmas spirit

DA NANG—Ask a GI in Vietnam about Christmas, and you'll probably get a mumbled reply about Bob Hope, or that it's really for the kids, or even that "it don't mean nothing."

Christmas, if you probe deeper, would mean "peace on earth" and

"goodwill to men". In these troubled times, with crises sprouting up at every hour, these qualities may seem hard to find.

The men of the 196th Infantry Brigade took the ideas that are the foundations of Christmas—peace and goodwill—to heart as they celebrated Christmas with Vietnamese children, mainly orphans.

These were several "parties" for the kids.

In conjunction with the Da Nang American Red Cross girls, the brigade chaplain's office threw a party for the children of the Phuoc Thanh Orphanage at the Freedom Hill Red Cross.

Santa Claus made an appearance and presented the children with Christmas stockings which contained candy and small presents. Refreshments were served and the children sang Vietnam and traditional Christmas carols in English.

After the carols, the children performed some native dances and were well received by the Chargers in attendance. Candy, fruit and Kool Aid were also served to the children.

On Dec. 23, the men of the 2d Bn., 1st Inf. went to the Sacred Heart Orphanage—taking the 196th band with them—to celebrate Christmas with the children.

1st Sqd., 1st Cav. held a party for about 100 children from the China Beach Protestant Orphanage in the squadron's enlisted men's club, on Dec. 24.

Christmas Eve was also the date of the Christmas party given by the 3d Bn., 21st Inf. for 80 children from the Phuoc Thanh Orphanage. Toys and clothes—a ton-and-a-half of them, collected in a drive by a Dover, N.H. radio station—were distributed to the children, who entertained with singing and dancing, accompanied by the brigade's band.

The 37 children of Hoa Loc Orphanage hosted the men of the 1st Bn., 46th Inf. at the orphanage. The men from 1st Bn., 46th Inf. brought food and presents to brighten the Christmas of the children.

These weren't the only units in the 196th making Christmas a little more special for Vietnamese children in the vicinity.

On Dec. 24, the brigade's Support Battalion (Prov.) hosted 75 children from the village of Con Son for lunch and gift-giving.

The day after Christmas, men from the 3d Bn., 82d Arty. distributed candy to the children of Da Son village.

Cardinal Cooke tours Charger country

DA NANG—Terence Cardinal Cooke, Archbishop of New York and Military Vicar to all US Armed Forces, recently visited the 196th Infantry Brigade on a stop in his fourth annual trip around the globe to visit American servicemen.

During his afternoon visit with the 196th on Dec. 30 the Cardinal traveled out to Landing Zones (LZ) Linda and Maude where he spent his time talking with the men. He also visited with Brigadier General Joseph C. McDonough, 196th Infantry Brigade commander.

Cardinal Cooke's visit to the brigade was highlighted at LZ Maude where he was presented with a plaque making him an honorary Charger.

Among other areas of the world the 50-year-old Cardinal has visited thus far are Thailand, Europe and Jerusalem, where he spent the Christmas holiday.

After visiting Pleiku and a few other locations in South Vietnam, Cardinal Cooke planned to head on to Hong Kong and various US installations in the Pacific on his way back to the states.

As the military Vicar to the US Armed Forces Cardinal Cooke's Military Ordinate comprises: nearly 3000 Catholic priests in the Armed Forces and Veterans Administration; all Catholics in the Armed Forces (including the Coast Guard, etc.), all Catholics who officially accompany or assist the Military Government or the Government of Occupation and all who are employed by the United States or who are engaged in diplomatic and similar missions in foreign nations. These include some 2,000,000 Catholic personnel and military families.

In addition, his Archdiocese of New York has nearly 2,000,000 more Catholics in it.

The 196th Light Infantry Brigade Association has received tax exempt status. This means that contributions are tax deductible on your income tax.


We are also able to reduce mailing costs as a tax exempt organization.
